APRIL 11 & 12 - RESURRECTION OF OUR LORD - EASTER

This is the day the Lord has made! Christ is risen, and through him all creation is made new! We sing hymns of praise, gather around sacred words, and proclaim God's faithfulness, power, and love. With the women at the tomb, we are astonished, elated, and grateful. We depart with joy to proclaim the good news of God's endless love. Readings: Acts 10:34-43, Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24, Colossians 3:1-4, Matthew 28:1-10. **Recording will be posted on the St. James website and emailed.**

The Paschal Candle, first lit at Easter, shows the presence of the risen Christ among his people. It is also lit at baptisms and funerals throughout the year as a sign of dying and rising with Christ, of our death and his life. The Paschal Candle is given in loving memory of **Treva Weikert** by the Redding Family.

APRIL 18/19 - SECOND OF EASTER

In today's gospel the risen Christ appears to the disciples and offers them the gift of peace. Even amid doubts and questions, we experience the resurrection in our Sunday gathering around word and meal, and in our everyday lives. SUMMARY OF MARCH 18, 2020 COUNCIL MEETING

The meeting was held by telephone conference due to the Coronavirus quarantine.

Minutes:

Minutes from the February 12 meeting were approved.

Treasurer's Report:

Treasurer Karen Lentz was not present, but she had submitted her report via email. The report showed that through January and February 2020 regular giving was \$110,829 compared to \$105,400 in January and February 2019. However, Council expressed concern about finances with the Coronavirus causing cancellation of all church activities and services going forward. Following a motion, the Treasurer's Report was approved.

Coronavirus Report:

Pr. Allwein reported the Early Learning Center closed Monday, March 16. Concern was expressed for the teachers who are now not working and how they will manage if they have no income. They do not qualify for unemployment compensation since the Center does not pay for unemployment compensation insurance. The monthly cost for Early Learning Center personnel is around \$52,000 if they are to be compensated.

Bishop Dunlop has been issuing weekly messages and recently he asked pastors to keep churches closed through March. This will be updated weekly.

Visits by pastors are not currently permitted in nursing facilities and hospitals. Hospital chaplains are currently covering faith based needs. Peters and Monahan Funeral Homes have placed a hold on funerals although no St. James members have recently died.

Construction Report:

Kyle Smith reported that the roof is nearing completion. No egregious conditions were present in the roof decking. Repointing and first phase windows are complete. The kitchen remodel will begin about April 18.

Shaffer Design Associates, P.C. submitted a proposal for the following Capital Campaign projects:

- Security improvements to existing stairwell and elevator \$4,000
- Phase 2 window evaluation and design \$3,600
- Gathering area design, construction consulting, etc. \$6,000
- Construction Phase services and observation \$0
 Gary will bill for hours provided by his staff, but will bill \$0 for his own hours.

Property Committee moved that this proposal be accepted. Council approved.

Nominating Committee:

The Nominating Committee reported that two people have agreed to run for Council this spring for three-year terms. They are **Carol Cook and Alan Haynes**. Several more members are considering running for the two remaining Council seats. **Emili Scavitto** has agreed to serve as the Youth Representative again.

Sharing:

Council members shared thoughts about the current Coronavirus situation. Several expressed appreciation for the technology we have to bring sermons and services to members on the St. James website and YouTube. Concern was expressed about church and personal finances since some members have now lost jobs and their source of income. Pr. Allwein stated that in meetings with Lutheran pastors on Tuesday and the Gettysburg Ministerium on Wednesday, there were many expressions of hope and blessings for all. There was expressed concern that this may go on for some time, but that we also might be able to use this time to look for opportunities and to stay positive.

Leaders in Adams County provide support during this public health crisis!

Last week, our partners at the Adams County Community Foundation_hosted a conference call on March 24, 2020, inviting leaders from key community organizations to share updates about their efforts to provide support during this time and to answer questions from community members who were also on the call. Here's what you might've missed:

ADAMS COUNTY COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

Is encouraging you to...**Stand by your favorites:** Give to the organizations of all sorts that you already support. They can't survive without your help. Those providing food and other basic needs will see demand for services increase. **Think strategically:** Consider renewing your supporting memberships to organizations that work to bring resources to our community, like Adams Economic Alliance, Destination Gettysburg, and Main Street Gettysburg. **Open your heart:** Add to your list or increase your giving to organizations providing direct support--housing, food, care of all kinds--to people most in need.

ADAMS ECONOMIC ALLIANCE

The Alliance is now processing applications for the COVID19 Working Capital Access Loan Program administered by the Pennsylvania Industrial Development Authority (PIDA). Adams Economic Alliance is working diligently to help businesses recover from declared disaster. Visit the Alliance website for more information.

THE CHAMBER OF GETTYSBURG AND ADAMS COUNTY

is committed to gaining a better understanding of what information and resources are available in our region to share with folks in the County. Updates on changes in local economy and organizations can be found on the Chamber's Facebook page and website. Subscribe to the Chamber's mailing list to stay up to date on these developments.

THE COUNTY OF ADAMS/ADAMS COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

The main areas of focus for county relief and safety include ensuring that county emergency and other required services are available, county representatives acting as conduits to educate state and federal officials and providing updates from these leaders to our residents, working with community agencies to coordinate necessary services such as food, shelter, and other supplies to support during this time. The best way residents can help at this time is to stay safe by staying indoors and to continue practicing appropriate social distancing measures.

GETTYSBURG TIMES

Gettysburg Times staff is working to connect the community by sharing vital information regarding the virus but also to share stories that are a happy distraction from current events. Reach out to Gettysburg Times to share stories to aid in boosting morale in the community! The paper is now completely online, physical copies of the paper will be delivered only three days per week.

ADAMS COUNTY HOUSING AUTHORITY

Is working to continue the housing process by mail, the recertification process is now done by mail and email, phone interviews are being conducted, and the Housing Authority's lobby is open for mail pick-up and delivery. Interested program participants can drop off applications, here and have access to the lobby phone to contact caseworkers, property managers and to pay rent. Project new start is still accepting applications at this time. Physical copies of this application can be found in the lobby or on the Housing Authority's website. Routine inspections are postponed and emergency eviction processes are not initiated at this time. For those in need of medication or food, staff is available to clients by phone.

SOUTH CENTRAL COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAMS (SCCAP)

Is working to flatten the curve and community spread by educating the community with accessible resources. SCCAP is active in partnering and working with other organizations in the community. SCCAP Shelter was gifted a tablet for virtual Urgent Care appointments with consumers if needed. SCCAP Gettysburg Food Pantry is providing prebagged groceries for clients at this time to decrease the risk of contact while providing essential service to the community. SCCAP is working with hotels to identify local housing options. The Adams County Assistance Office is open but is not seeing clients at this time. To speak with a representative, contact the Office by phone or visit the website for further instruction. The Adams County Office of Aging is still providing Meals on Wheels to the area.

UNITED WAY OF ADAMS COUNTY

Is encouraging the use of 211 during this challenging time for emotional support and increased access to important resources. 211 is an easy to remember telephone number meant for callers to gain referrals and information about health, human, and social service organizations in the area. United Way urges Adams residents to continue checking in on neighbors, coworkers, family and friends to stay socially connected. Tax filing assistance is now available online for those who need!

WELLSPAN

Please visit WellSpan's website for the most accurate and up to date information about how to stay safe and healthy during this public health crisis. Some important notes: Screening for the virus is in place and open-air screenings are located in the area near the Gettysburg Hospital's Emergency Room, at WellSpan Family Fairfield, and WellSpan Adams Health Center. **Screening is only available for those who have been instructed by a physician to get screened**. All volunteer activities at the Hospital have been suspended and there are no visitors allowed at this time. Outpatient rehabilitation is done virtually. The hospital is doing ok on supplies at this time. IF you donate, do not drop donations at the Hospital as there is a group trying to coordinate donation collection. Blood drives are still happening at this time as there is still a great need. Lastly, virtual doctor's visits are available and social distancing is one of the best things we can do right now to stop the spread.
