A few glimpses of where we are here at St. James:

Our staff is motivated by a deep commitment to the mission of St. James to provide the highest quality of pastoral care; however, each staff member also carries the burdens of personal and family challenges in face of their lives up-ended by COVID-19. WORSHIP PREVIEWS

MAY 3 - FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Today is sometimes called "Good Shepherd Sunday." Jesus is called the "gate" of the sheep in today's gospel. The risen Christ opens the way to abundant life. He anoints our heads with oil and guides us beside the still waters of our baptism. Youth Sunday/Waterlife.

Readings: Acts 2:42-47, Psalm 23, 1 Peter 2:19-25, John 10:1-10.

MAY 10 - FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

As we continue to celebrate the fifty days of Easter, today's gospel includes Jesus' promise that he goes to prepare a place for his followers in his Father's house. Our baptism commissions us to share Jesus' mission in the world. As 1 Peter reminds us, we are a holy people, called to proclaim the one who called us out of darkness into light.

Readings: Acts 7:55-60, Psalm 31:1-5, 15-16, 1 Peter 2:2-10, John 14:1-14.

MAY 17 - SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Jesus does not abandon his followers. Through the Holy Spirit, Jesus comes to abide with his disciples of every generation. As Pentecost draws near, we are reminded that the risen Christ dwells in us as the Spirit of truth. We receive this Spirit in baptism.

Readings: Acts 17:22-31, Psalm 66:8-20, 1 Peter 3:13-22, John 14:15-21.

MAY 24 – SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

We gather with the disciples in the upper room, waiting for the Spirit to transform the church around the world. In today's gospel Jesus prays for his followers and for their mission in his name. Amid religious, social, and economic divisions, we seek unity that Jesus had with his Father.

Readings: Acts 1:6-14, Psalm 68:1-10, 32-35, 1 Peter 4:12-14; 5:6-11, John 17:1-11.

MAY 31 - DAY OF PENTECOST

Fifty days after Easter, we celebrate the Holy Spirit as God's presence within and among us. In Acts the Spirit arrives in rushing wind and flame, bringing God' presence to all people. Paul reminds us that though we each have different capacities we are unified in the Spirit that equips us with these gifts. Jesus breathes the Holy Spirit on his disciples, empowering them to forgive sin. We celebrate that we too are given the breath of the Holy Spirit and sent out to proclaim God's redeeming love to all the world. Readings: Acts 2:1-21, Psalm 104:24-34, 35b, 1 Corinthians 12:3b-13, John 20:19-23.

APRIL 15, 2020 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MINUTES

(Meeting held remotely.)

Special Council Meeting:

A virtual meeting via Zoom was held on April 6 to act on a motion dealing with the federal small business loan program called Paycheck Protection Program. The purpose of the loan was to enable continuation of salaries for St. James church and Early Learning Center personnel. The following motion was made and approved: "To authorize St. James Lutheran Church to obtain a Paycheck Protection Program loan through the Small Business Administration for \$235,076 to provide staffing costs for St. James Lutheran Church and St. James Early Learning Center and to approve and ratify the application submitted April 3 and signed by Dan Bringman, Council President."

<u>Devotions, Correspondence & Minutes:</u> Minutes from the March 18, 2020 meeting were approved.

Dialogue of Thanksgiving:

Pastor Andrew and several members of Council provided devotions celebrating Pr. Mike Allwein's 40 years of ordination. The congregation was to celebrate Pr. Mike's 40th year at a Sunday service this month, but due to the Corona virus, the celebration was impossible. We thank God for Pr. Mike's love, service and devotion to our congregation.

Treasurer's Report:

Karen Lentz's treasurer's report was approved. After three months of 2020, the giving income was about \$20,000 below the same period in 2019, and about \$34,000 below the 2020 budget.

Committee Reports:

Capital Campaign - The Capital Campaign has received \$509,489 thus far and has spent \$189,283, leaving a balance of \$320,206.

Property – Things have been at a standstill recently since most construction has been shut down. Most of the roof is complete and no leaks have been seen since the new roof and new caps on the brick parapet have been installed. The new alarm system is mostly complete as well. When the state legislature and governor open construction businesses, the work will continue.

Mission Fund – The fund contained \$6,180 and the committee decided that they would use only \$5,000 in 2020. The balance would be reserved for the 2021 distribution. The Mission Fund Committee moved that \$2,500 be allocated to fund Reach Workcamps and \$2,500 be allocated for the Lutheran World Relief Middle East Appeal. Council approved the recommendation.

Council Nominations – Four people and a youth representative have agreed to be nominees for Council beginning in July. They are: **Carol Cook, Jim Dunlop, Alan Haynes, Brent Smith, and Emili Scavitto** (youth representative). Council is researching how the nominees might be elected to begin in July without having church services (where nominations and elections have been traditionally held).

Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) – Dan Bringman reported that the PPP (approved by Council April 6 as reported above) was approved April 15. The Early Learning Center and Church Staff will begin to be paid with the loan dollars in the coming weeks.

Good for God/Church/Council:

Pr. Allwein reported that the Gettysburg Ministerium has been meeting frequently and he was pleased to report that there has been wonderful cooperation and coordination between the Ministerium and social programs in the county. The spirit in the community is excellent. They have been dealing with issues related to food distribution and facemasks. Also, the St. James staff has been meeting remotely. Staff is working to stay in contact with people, and the pastors are available to anyone in need of assistance.
